Georgia loved life and was always ready for fun. Her ancestry was Polish, but she embraced Eddy's large Irish family. At family weddings, she was the first on the dance floor when the Polka music started. Eddy grew up on the West Side of Chicago in Presentation Parish and kept in touch with many friends and families from this parish. He was a best friend to my father who also grew up in Presentation.

I was looking through photos of Georgia this last week and one caught my attention. The photo here of the McGoverns singing a song in memory of my Dad.

The tune was called "Jelly Bean (He's A Curbstone Cutie)"; made popular in the late 1930s by Phil Harris and other artists. Whether this Phil Harris version inspired my Dad to enjoy the song, we don't know. My Dad died young and we never had the chance to ask him. For many years, he entertained friends and family with his rendition. He sang this when he had a few beers, but as we grew older, we would urge him to sing for us. And he did. Eventually, my siblings and I would sing the song ourselves. Once or twice in front of my Dad and once or twice with my Dad. The song has become one of those memories we like to keep alive. One such moment was at my sister's wedding in 2006. About halfway through the reception during a break in the music, the McGovern Family, young and old, took the microphone and sang Jellybean to my sister. It was so fun. And who was standing with us singing? Aunt Georgia. Every time I think of this, I smile and get emotional. She stood and sang with us; relishing the moment to be with us, and celebrate my Dad's memory. Classic Aunt Georgia.
