

Buddy's Letter to Home May 24, 1954

Hope you are all having a restful Memorial Day. Today, on our Uncle Buddy trail, all I have is an envelope.



The envelope is postmarked with the date of May 24, 1954. But the letter is missing and probably lost over time. As you see my Uncle Patrick 'Buddy' Fallon was writing to his sister, Sr. Patricia Fallon, "Dolly". If you have been following, Buddy was the youngest boy in the Fallon Family. He was born in 1931, and was older brother to my mother, Ann, the youngest Fallon. From oldest to youngest, the Fallons are:

Baby 1 (named John) (stillbirth) 1915-1915

Mary Ellen 1916-1992

John Joseph 1917-2003

Martin Joseph (later, made Patrick his middle name) 1919-1982

Katherine (stillborn) 1920-1920

Thomas Francis (later, made Joseph his middle name) 1921-1987

James Joseph 1922-2009

Edward Joseph 1924-1994

Catherine Virginia (later Sr. Mary Patricia OSB) 1926-2016

Irene Frances 1929-2007

Patrick Joseph, Jr. 1931-1954

Ann Cecilia 1933-2020



Born: May 13, 1931 at 3940 W. Polk St., Chicago, Cook County, Illinois

Baptism: May 31, 1931 at Presentation Catholic Church, 734 S. Springfield, Chicago, Illinois

Resided: 3940 W. Polk St., Chicago, Illinois

Grammar School:

Presentation School from 1st grade to 8th grade. Graduated June 1944







High School:

1944 to 1946 (Freshman): Unsure of school attended

1946 to 1947 (Sophomore) 10th Grade: St. Bede Academy, Peru, LaSalle County, Illinois. https://www.st-bede.com/


St. Bede was (and still is) a Catholic High School affiliated with the Monks of the Order of St. Benedict (OSB). Buddy's older brother Marty (Fr. Martin Fallon) also attended St. Bedes for one year and his sister Dolly (Sr. Patricia Fallon) was herself, a Benedictine sister with Sacred Heart Monastery located in Lisle, Illinois

1947 to 1948: Unsure of school attended; did not receive credit for 11th grade











Employment:

June 1948 to June 1951: Aldens Inc.

His job was Receiving Clerk and his duties included: worked in the receiving department of a large mail order house. Received incoming shipments on trucks, unloaded truck, verified shipment for completeness and sent merchandise to proper departments.

Sears: unsure of dates. I was told he worked at Sears – a job he probably obtained because his brother John (and John's future wife, Ann Rogulich) worked at Sears. John retired from Sears in the mid 1980's after 40 years employment.

Navy:

October 15, 1951 enlisted (note: his sister Ann's 18th birthday)

The enlistment was for 4 years of service (until October 1955). Buddy was sent to Naval Training Center in Great Lakes, Illinois for training.






